



## CONTEMPORARY ART EXHIBIT Phillips Library

During the Festival Week, the Phillips Library is transformed into the Art Gallery. Through the kindness and cooperation of many outstanding artists, along with our own workshop leaders, we are able to exhibit a variety of trends in contemporary art. This year, we will exhibit the work of a number of outstanding artists from the State of Arizona.

## The Orme School FINE ARTS COLLECTION

The first Festival Exhibit inspired us to begin The Orme School Fine Arts Collection. This year, we will feature art which has been purchased by the School during past Fine Arts Festivals, beginning in 1969. These works have been purchased through the funds raised by students, faculty, parents, and other friends of Orme.

# THE WORKSHOPS

## CREATIVE WRITING James Ciletti (31<sup>st</sup> Year)

This workshop will focus on writing lyrical and narrative poetry. Word exercises, poetry reading, nature walks, and verbal story telling will be combined to stimulate the creative writing process.

## LIGHT PHENOMENON as ART Tom Fresh (30<sup>th</sup> Year)

Workshop participants use prisms, clay, mirrors, and nature to explore the properties of light. The spectrum is used to create an environment of moving rainbows and magnificent colors that are constantly changing.

#### **PHOTOGRAHPY** Jay Dusard (30<sup>th</sup> Year)

Students will learn to develop film, proof negatives, make enlargements, and mount them for display. An emphasis will be placed on vision, design, expression, and craftsmanship.

# CERAMICS

<u>Maurice Grossman (30<sup>th</sup> Year)</u> Students will learn some basic processes and techniques for making pottery and art from clay. Coil building, slab making, and wheel throwing will be explored, as well as glazing and firing.

## METAL SCULPTURE Rod Lingren (20<sup>th</sup> Year)

Form, function, balance, and motion are combined as students use brass rods, soldering irons, and small electric motors to produce works of kinetic (moving) art.

#### **DRAMA** John Brownlee (16<sup>th</sup> Year)

Aspiring actors & actresses will learn how words and movement combine to produce a believable character. Study of voice, emotion, physical energy, and movement culminate in a fully-staged performance of an abridged one-act play.

## DANCE

Mark Vanek/Diane M. Hunt (8<sup>th</sup> Year)

Students will learn by facilitating the creative process with dance, that new doors are opened to problem–solving, understanding relationships with one another, and our environment.

# STAINED GLASS

Ramson Lomatewama (8th Year)

Students will explore sunlight as a design element. Color, shape, texture, and dimensional possibilities which are inherent in combining glass, copper tape, & solder are limited only by imagination.

### **SONGWRITING** Nancy Bryan (8<sup>th</sup> Year)

Students will explore how popular songs are written and performed, as well as all aspects of song construction—melody, chords, rhythm, lyrics, and instruments.

## WORLD MUSIC Marcie Brown (5<sup>th</sup> Year)

This workshop will introduce the music of different cultures from around the world, including reggae, blues, calypso, bosa nova, African, and jazz. Students will be encouraged to add their own creative voices to the workshop's final projects.

## IRONWORKING Matt Koestner (5<sup>th</sup> Year)

Participants will be introduced to basic skills of blacksmithing, forging, and metal sculpting. They will explore various processes involved in making a creative statement with metal as a medium.

## JEWELRY MAKING Larry Alder (5<sup>th</sup> Year)

Students will become acquainted with the tools and equipment used in the creation of jewelry, and will experiment with a variety of metal–working techniques.

## WOODCARVING Steve Kafka (5<sup>th</sup> Year)

Students will learn the basic skills and techniques. They will become familiar with a variety of tools and their use in this old traditional craft. Projects will include the handcarving of a wooden sign by each individual.

# **VIDEO PRODUCTION**

Robert Smith (4rd Year)

Students will learn how to use storyboards and a video camera. Editing, the use of music, visual effects, and animation using a computer will also be explored.

# WATERCOLOR

Lynlie Hermann (3rd Year)

By learning to work with paints, brush strokes, abstract shapes, and the elements of nature, students will explore ways in which artists can use their own visual imagery to release their imaginations.

# RAKU CERAMICS

Joni Pevarnik (2<sup>nd</sup> Year)

Students will learn about pottery-making techniques including wheel throwing, with an emphasis on the Japanese firing process known as "Raku."

#### CONTEMPORARY MUSICIANSHIP Silas Hite (1<sup>st</sup> Year)

Students will be given the opportunity to play their instruments with other musicians in a band type setting. Through group and individual instruction, students will learn and perform popular music of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century.

## DRAWING

<u>Maureen Smiley (1<sup>st</sup> Year)</u> Students will explore a variety of drawing techniques including line, gesture, and shading.
