CONTEMPORARY ART EXHIBIT Phillips Library

Through the kindness and cooperation of many outstanding artists, along with our own workshop leaders, we are able to exhibit a variety of trends in contemporary art. This year, we will exhibit the work of a number of outstanding artists from the State of Arizona.

The Josephine Jenks Rogers Fine Arts Festival Endowment

In 1995, Josephine J. Rogers, the grandmother of distinguished alumna Helen Hudson Weaver '70, willed \$100,000 to Orme to permanently endow The Orme School's Fine Arts Festival. Through Mrs. Rogers' generosity and the vision of her granddaughter, Helen, the Fine Arts Festival's endowment has continued to grow and provide annual funding to one of Orme's most important and unique programs. Orme will always be grateful to Mrs. Rogers, the Jenks Trust, Helen, and her family for their generosity in creating this permanent endowment for the arts at Orme.

THE WORKSHOPS

CREATIVE WRITING James Ciletti (34th Year)

This workshop will focus on writing lyrical and narrative poetry. Word exercises, poetry reading, nature walks, and verbal story telling will be combined to stimulate the creative writing process.

PHOTOGRAHPY Jay Dusard (33rd Year)

Students will learn to develop film, proof negatives, make enlargements, and mount them for display. An emphasis will be placed on vision, design, expression, and craftsmanship.

CERAMICS

Maurice Grossman (33rd Year)

Students will learn some basic processes and techniques for making pottery and art from clay. Coil building, slab making, and wheel throwing will be explored, as well as glazing and firing.

DRAMA

John Brownlee (19th Year)

Aspiring actors & actresses will learn how words and movement combine to produce a believable character. Study of voice, emotion, physical energy, and movement culminate in a fully-staged performance of an abridged one-act play.

STAINED GLASS

Ramson Lomatewama (11th Year)

Students will explore sunlight as a design element. Color, shape, texture, and dimensional possibilities which are inherent in combining glass, copper tape, and solder are limited only by the imagination.

JEWELRY MAKING Larry Alder (8th Year)

Students will become acquainted with the tools and equipment used in the creation of jewelry, and will experiment with a variety of metal-working techniques.

VIDEO PRODUCTION Robert Smith (7th Year)

Students will learn how to use story boards and a video camera. Editing, the use of music, visual effects, and animation using a computer will also be explored.

WATER COLOR Lynlie Hermann (6th Year)

By learning to work with paints, brush strokes, abstract shapes, and the elements of nature, students will explore ways in which artists can use their own visual imagery to release their imaginations.

DANCE/ART IN MOTION Jennifer Schauffler & Breanna Rogers (1st Year)

Students will experience dance and movement as Art, and the body as a fine instrument for creating power and beauty.

COMPUTER ART Kvin Lambson (1st Year)

Students will explore the possibilities and techniques of the computer for creative expression in both commercial and fine art. Adobe Photoshop and other software will be used.

PRINTMAKING & MONOTYPE Carol Kennedy (1st Year)

Students will learn to make gelatin plates from which they will print one of a kind monoprints using materials from nature, as well as hand cut stencils. A variety of styles and techniques will be explored.

METAL SCULPTURE & CASTING

Brian Painter (1st Year)

Students will explore various methods for sculpture, using steel as the principal media. Students will forge and weld primarily with oxygen and acetylene torches.
