The Workshops

Glassblowing Ramson Lomatewama – 22nd Year Phil Atwood – 9th Year

This workshop will explore color, form and the challenge of working with glass in a 'hot shop.' Students will learn the basics of hot glass work by creating paperweights. The next level of their work will involve actual glass blowing. This workshop requires good physical condition as the work will be

intense and hot.



Computer Art Kevn Lambson – 11th Year



In this workshop, Orme students will have an opportunity to explore and discover a wide range of possibilities and techniques involved in using the computer for creative expression in both commercial and fine art.



Stained Glass Caryl Lomatewama – 11th Year



Students in this workshop will explore sunlight as a design element. They will discover color, shape, texture and dimensional possibilities inherent in combining glass, copper tape and one's own



West African Drumming Three Trees – 10th Year



This workshop will allow participants an opportunity to explore the joyful and empowering rhythms of West Africa. Workshop will include instruction in full ensemble rhythm parts and techniques. It will also cover the culture and

community importance of drumming in West Africa.



Watercolors Chris Masiello – 7th Year



By learning to work with paints, brush strokes, abstract shapes and the elements of nature, students will explore ways in which artists use their own visual imagery to release their imagination in this workshop.



Fabric Arts Kate '72 & Jim '73 Carroll – 7th Year



Students will learn various methods of quilt/piecework construction in the process of creating a wall piece in their own original design. Several methods of picture construction will be introduced, including

straight, curved, circle, cut edge piecing, and many types of embellishment techniques.



Hip Hop Dance Dusty Savage – 3rd Year



This workshop will be based on two different forms of dance, including hip hop and contemporary. Although these are opposite styles of dance, they will allow participants to explore their minds through the movement of dance. Come ready for fun and a terrific workout!



Sculpture **Chequamegon & Charles Orme** – 3^{rd T}Year



Students will produce contemporary sculptural works, stepping away from traditional concept development and methods. Students will explore alternative mediums such as silicone and

found objects. Workshop participants will be encouraged to develop new approaches to their sculpture. Students will work on an individual project tailored to their interests. Critiques will be an integral part of the course. A brief lecture and slide presentation on contemporary sculpture will be included.

Oil Painting from Life Ray Roberts – 1st Year

This workshop will be about observing and painting from life. Students will learn the classic method of applying light and shadow to objects, landscape and architecture in their painting. It is this basic understanding that will open up the world as your subject, enabling the artist to paint whatever is in front of them. Beginning with drawing and then a block-in, students will learn Ray's method for painting. Students will be worked with individually to create thoughtful, light-filled paintings of their own. Be prepared to create lots of paintings this week.

Student attendance is mandatory at announcements, all workshop sessions, evening programs, as well as at the Grandparents Day luncheon, and final performances and presentations on Saturday.

Student participation is required for academic credit.
