WORKSHOP LEADERS

JAMES CILETTI (Poetry) Colorado Poet and Teacher. In great demand as a "Poetry in the schools" consultant for the National Endowment of the Arts Program. Most recent poems appeared in Poet Lore and Rocky Mountain Review.

PATRICIA CLARK (Printmaking) Artist and teacher of graphics and printmaking. On leave from the University of Wisconsin is now teaching printmaking at Yavapai College and has opened a studio, Arizona Atelier, in Prescott, Arizona.

FRANCES SMITH COHEN (Dance) Dancer and choreographer. Chairperson of Dance department at University of Arizona and resident choreographer for Arizona Civic Theatre and Tucson Symphony-Ballet Theatre. Studied with Martha Graham, Ethel Butler, Jose Limon and Madame Nijinska.

JAY DUSARD (Photography)

Artist, teacher and jazz musician. Studied photography with Ansel Adams and Frederick Sommer. Taught light graphics at Prescott College and has been widely exhibited in one-man shows throughout the country.



TOM FRESH (Environment and Light Phenomenon as Art) Imaginative artist and creator of special effects. Educated in Alabama, New York and Paris. His unique creations have been widely exhibited in the U.S. and Europe.

MAURICE GROSSMAN (Ceramics)

Professor of Art at the University of Arizona. Widely exhibited potter for over twenty years. He is constantly in demand as a resource person for workshops and craft councils throughout the U.S.

DONALD HAM (Film-Making)

Film-maker and director. A graduate of USC and Syracuse, he has directed and edited documentaries and editorials for Paramount Studios. He travelled extensively this past year in the South Pacific filming areas of poverty.

ROBERT HOLMES (Music)

Director of Music at Beverly Hills High and Chairman of Music Div. at USC campus at Idyllwild School of Music and Arts. Over 35 years in choral and instrumental teaching and conducting. He is frequently on tour with one of his choral groups.

RICHARD MARCUSEN (Metalcraft-Jewelry making) Member of the art department of Yavapai College. His creative jewelry is in constant demand for exhibition and private commissions.

JOHN MATHEWS (Sculpture)

Versatile artist and sculptor working in stained glass, welded steel and water color. Former Asst. Prof. of Art at Kansas State Teachers College, he now lives and works in Jerome, Arizona at his studio, The Aardvark Art Ark.

MARY MIZELL (Drama)

Actress, director and writer with considerable experience in Media-Theatre. She travels extensively as a featured writer for Arizona Living Magazine and Today Newspapers and teaches at "The Studio" in Phoenix.

JERRY REGUR (Fabrics and Fibers)

Artist and teacher of fabric design and creative stitchery at UC Riverside. One of three artists chosen to lecture on techniques at the Riverside Art Museum this year.

CYNTHIA RIGDEN (Sculpture)

Native Arizona artist with home and studio near Prescott. One of her large bronzes, a group of horses, was recently on exhibit in Los Angeles, and a number of her pieces were included in the Exhibit of Western Art at the Grand Central Galleries in New York.

Dancer and teacher. Studied in New York with Merce Cunningham. Former member of Frances Smith Cohen Dance Group. She has a Masters in Theatre from the University of Arizona and has been associated with the Arizona Civic Theatre for two years.

Internationally recognized painter, graphic artist, author and film-maker. His works hang in most of the museums and private collections of the U.S. and Europe. Now makes his home and studio in Escondido, California.

AGNESE UDINOTTI (Metal Sculpture)

Greek born artist now residing and working in Phoenix. Her work was highly acclaimed in Amsterdam this past summer, and a film of her life and work was presented on Dutch T.V. Exhibitions for the 1975-76 season include one-man shows in Arizona, Chicago, New York, Santa Fe, London, Ghent, Amsterdam and Athens.
